"Rosie the Riveter"



Prepare for an exciting World War II-themed evening as the Society presents **Mary Ann Jung**, an award-winning actress and Smithsonian scholar! She will perform the role of **Rosie the Riveter**, a composite sketch of the women who worked in the factories and industries during the 1940s while the men went to war.

Ms. Jung, creator of **History Alive!**, researches and writes her own scripts, and performs in the authentic costumes, accents and attitudes of her characters' eras. Her qualifications are extensive: she has appeared on CNN, the Today Show, Good Morning America and in newspapers around the world as famous women from history. She has been a lead actress and Director of Renaissance History and Shakespearean Language at the Maryland Renaissance Festival for thirty-four years.

Ms. Jung performed with the Florida Renaissance Festival until 2006 and was Director of Street Theater and Family Performances for ArtScape, Baltimore's city arts festival, for ten years. In 2002, her Clara Barton show won top honors for Solo Theatrical Performance from the Maryland State Arts Council. The Smithsonian Museum of Natural History has contracted Ms. Jung to present historical women for teachers' conferences since 2005. She has been featured at the National Theatre of Washington, the Folger Shakespeare Library, Port Discovery Children's Museum and the National Museum of Civil War Medicine. Since her programs are educational as well as entertaining, Ms. Jung appears at schools, libraries and museums.

The evening's performance will be fun, energetic and interactive as well as appropriate for all ages. We encourage you to bring your children and teenagers, who will be invited to join Ms. Jung as supporting characters! Her renditions of famous women and their times encourage a love of history, drama and literature.





Steve Vogel will discuss his newest book, "Through the Perilous Fight: Six Weeks That Saved the Nation," focusing on the capture and occupation of Alexandria during the War of 1812.


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The book is a superbly narrated and rapidly-paced account of the military activities in the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries, and recreates the events of the War of 1812 that led to the burning of the Capitol, the President's Mansion (present-day White House) and the subsequent attack on Baltimore and the bombardment of Fort McHenry. Having witnessed the destruction in Washington and facing a

threatening British naval squadron off its shore, Alexandria DC chose to acquiesce to British demands to permit them to seize merchandise and supplies stored in warehouses, thereby averting devastation of the town.

June 19: Confederates in Alexandria's Ivy Hill Cemetery
