

LECTURE

“A Southern Spy in Northern Virginia: The Civil War Album of Laura Ratcliffe”

Intelligence gathering for the Confederates was largely focused on Alexandria and the surrounding area. In “*A Southern Spy in Northern Virginia*,” author Charles V. (Chuck) Mauro recounts the story of an album that General J.E.B. Stuart gave to Laura Ratcliffe, a spy who lived in Frying Pan, Virginia (now Floris) during the Civil War. The album contained four poems written by Stuart to win her favor and persuade her to gather and transmit intelligence in western Fairfax County for the Confederate cause.

Ratcliffe used the album as a guestbook in which 40 guests—26 soldiers and 14 civilians—signed their names. The list includes J.E.B. Stuart, who signed “Your Friend,” as well as Major John Singleton Mosby, Brigadier General Fitzhugh Lee and 7 civilians from this area. Mauro solves the mystery behind this album, identifying who the soldiers were and when they could have signed its pages, revealing the covert lives and relationships of civilians and soldiers during the Civil War.

Please join us for a lively evening with Mr. Mauro, who is also the photographer for his book. He is the author and photographer of “*The Civil War in Fairfax County: Civilians and Soldiers*,” “*Herndon: A Town and Its History*” and “*Herndon: A History in Images*.” He received the Nan Netherton Heritage Award for his historical research, writing and photography of “*The Battle of Chantilly (Ox Hill), A Monumental Storm*,” and is the writer and co-producer of the award-winning independent film of the same title, based on his book. Mr. Mauro is also co-producer of the documentary “*Mosby’s*”

Open through August 3, 2013: “Living Legends of Alexandria: African American Activists” Exhibition



Sponsored by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission and organized by Darnall's Chance House Museum, the tour was led by Dr. Ralph E. Eshelman, author of 3 books on the War of 1812 in the Maryland area and also co-author of the well received ***In Full Glory Reflected***, an official publication of the Maryland Historical Society. To better understand events that led to the burning of the US Capitol and White House and surrender of Alexandria in 1814, I highly recommend both the tour and book. The book is available at The Lyceum bookstore.
